During the breeding season the area regularly supports:

<i>Sterna paradisaea</i> (Arctic - breeding/Southern Oceans - wintering)	1% of the GB breeding population SCRC 1985-1988 and Harvey et al (1991,1992)
<i>Troglodytes troglodytes fridariensis</i>	100% of the GB breeding population Count, as at 1997

During the breeding season the area regularly supports:

<i>Uria aalge</i> (East Atlantic)	1.4% of the breeding population SCRC 1985-1988 and Harvey et al (1991,1992)
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ARTICLE 4.2 QUALIFICATION (79/409/EEC): AN INTERNATIONALLY IMPORTANT ASSEMBLAGE OF BIRDS

During the breeding season the area regularly supports:

180000 seabirds - SCRC 1985-1988 and Harvey et al (1991,1992)

Including:

Alca torda, *Catharacta skua*, *Fratercula arctica*, *Fulmarus glacialis*, *Morus bassanus*, *Phalacrocorax aristotelis*, *Rissa tridactyla*, *Stercorarius parasiticus*, *Sterna paradisaea*, *Uria aalge*.

4.3 Vulnerability

There are no significant threats to the interest at present.
SNH contribute to the funding of a ranger service on the island which helps to limit visitor disturbance to breeding seabirds.
Birds are also vulnerable to predation from domestic and feral cats.
